## Did you know...?



One of the most famous logos in the world is the **Nike** logo. It was <sup>1</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ by an American student, Carolyn Davidson, in 1971. Ms Davidson was only paid \$35 dollars for her design. However, she was later <sup>2</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ a gold ring in the shape of the logo and Nike shares.

**T**inned food was <sup>3</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ in 1810 in Britain by Peter Durand.

Unfortunately, he did not also invent a tin opener, so tins were <sup>4</sup>\_\_\_\_\_ with difficulty using a knife and a hammer. It wasn't until nearly 50 years later that the American Ezra Warner invented the tin opener.
